What is the purpose of this update?

This document tells you how the US Small Cap Fund has performed and what fees were charged. The document will help you to compare the fund with other funds. Smartshares Limited prepared this update in accordance with the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013. This information is not audited and may be updated.

Description of this fund

Invests in US shares and is designed to track the return (before tax, fees and other expenses) of the CRSP US Small Cap Index.

What are the risks of investing?

Risk indicator for the US Small Cap Fund



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund's assets

goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

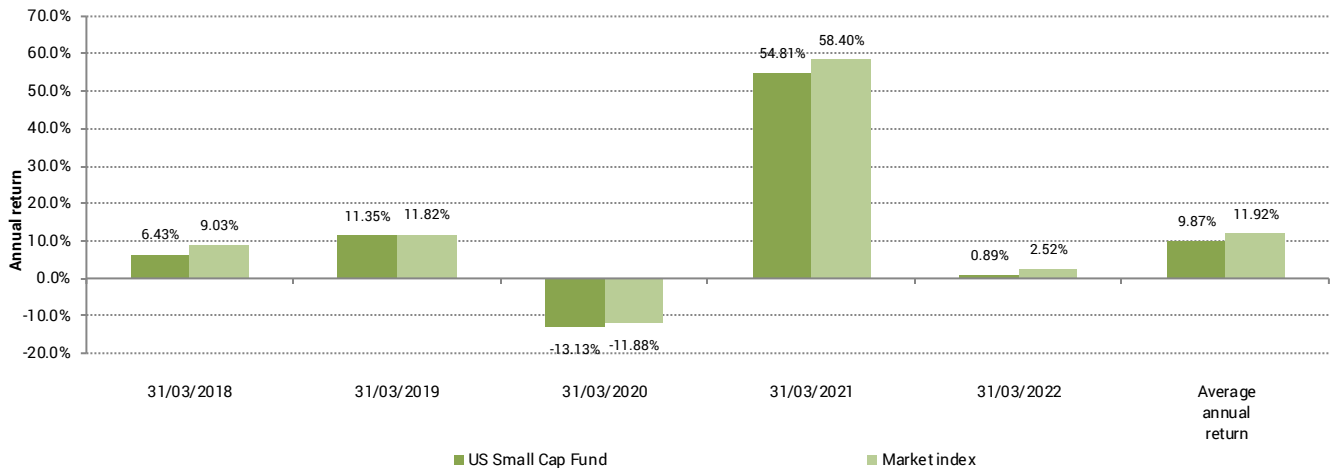
How has the fund performed?

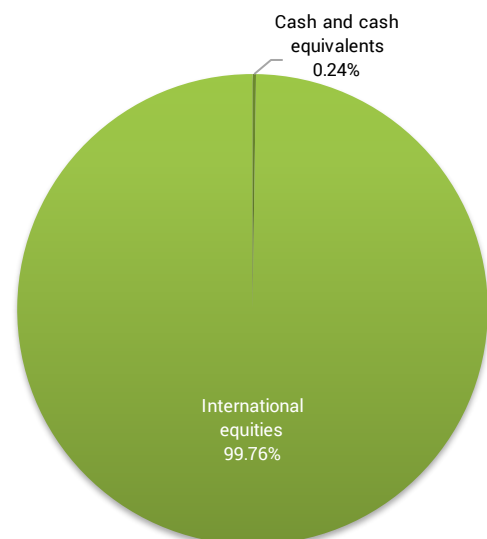
Example of how this applies to an investor

Jess had \$10,000 in the fund at the start of the year and did not make any further contributions. At the end of the year, Jess incurred a loss after fund charges were deducted of -\$1,194 (that is -11.94% of her initial \$10,000). Jess paid other charges of \$12. This gives Jess a total loss after tax of -\$1,206 for the year.
