SuperLife^{Age Steps} - Age 70

For the quarter ended 31 March 2017.

This investment update was first made publicly available on 28 April 2017.

What is the purpose of this update?

This document tells you how SuperLife^{Age Steps} - Age 70 has performed and what fees were charged. The document will help you to compare the stage with funds. Smartshares Limited prepared this update in accordance with the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013. This information is not audited and may be updated.

Description of this stage

SuperLife^{Age Steps} automatically adjusts the proportion of your investment in income and growth assets depending on your age. As you get older, the proportion of your investment in higher risk growth assets will be reduced, lowering the expected size of the ups and downs in the value of your investment. This option may be suitable if you are saving for retirement (assumed to be age 65), and assumes you will continue to invest your savings and spend them over your retirement period.

Your SuperLife^{Age Steps} - age 70 investment will be allocated 60% to SuperLife^{Income} and 40% to SuperLife¹⁰⁰ (which are managed funds this stage invests in).

What are the risks of investing?

Risk indicator for SuperLife^{Age Steps} - Age 70 ¹



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the stage's assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

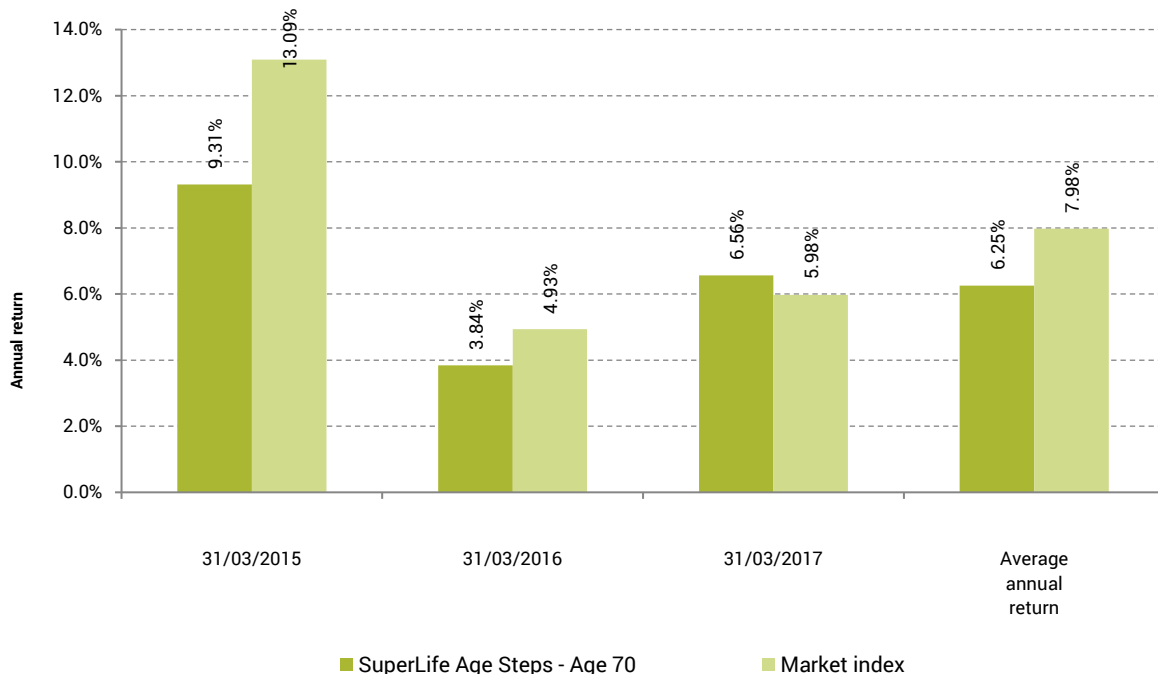

How has the stage performed?

Annual return graph



This shows the return after fund charges and tax for each year ending 31 March since the stage started. The last bar shows the average annual return since the stage started, up to 31 March 2017.

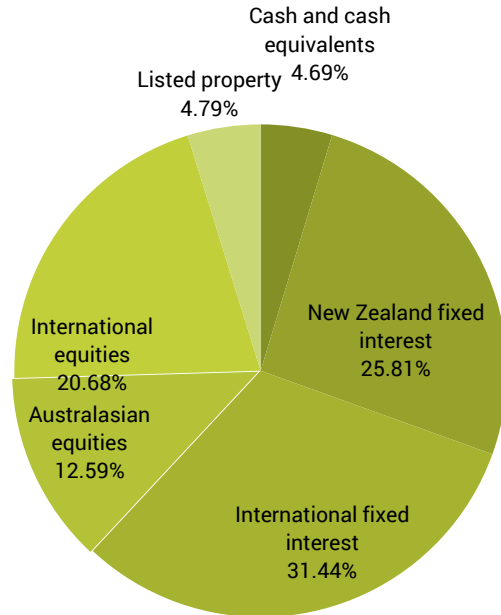
Example of how this applies to an investor

Jess had \$10,000 in the stage and did not make any further contributions. At the end of the year, Jess received a return after fund charges were deducted of \$656 (that is 6.56% of her initial \$10,000). Jess paid other charges of \$32³. This gives Jess a total return after tax of \$624 for the year.

Notes

- 1 Market index returns (as well as actual returns) have been used to complete the risk indicator as SuperLife^{Age Steps – Age 70} invests in SuperLife^{Income} and SuperLife¹⁰⁰ (together with the NZ Cash Fund), which have not been in existence for 5 years. As a result, the risk indicator may provide a less reliable indicator of the potential future volatility of SuperLife^{Age Steps – Age 70}. The risk indicator for SuperLife^{Age Steps – Age 70} uses 1 year and 6 months of market index returns for SuperLife^{Income} and SuperLife¹⁰⁰.
- 2 On 9 November 2016, the total management and administration changed to 0.57% per annum. As a result, the total fund charges will be different in the year to 31 March 2018.
- 3 On 9 November 2016, the administration fee changed to \$30 per annum. As a result, the amount set out in the fees table is made up of 4 months of \$2.50 per month (when the administration fee was \$30 per annum) and 8 months of \$2.75 per month (when the administration fee was \$33 per annum).
