

# SuperLife UK pension transfer scheme

## Overseas Shares Fund

This fund update replaces the fund update for the quarter ended 31 December 2017 that was first made publicly available on 26 January 2018. Note 1 has been updated to refer to 7 December 2017 changes to the total management and administration charges.

### Fund update for the quarter ended 31 December 2017

This fund update was first made publicly available on 5 February 2018.

### What is the purpose of this update?

This document tells you how the Overseas Shares Fund has performed and what fees were charged. The document will help you to compare the fund with other funds. Smartshares Limited prepared this update in accordance with the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013. This information is not audited and may be updated.

### Description of this fund

The Overseas Shares Fund is designed to provide a return (after tax, fees and other expenses) that reflects the after-tax return on the international share markets of developed economies, including the impact of foreign currency movements.

### What are the risks of investing?

#### Risk indicator for the Overseas Shares Fund



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund's assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

#### Other specific risks

There are other risks that may increase the risk to returns for investors, which are not reflected in the risk indicator. These risks include investment management risk. In particular, while the SuperLife UK pension transfer scheme's philosophy is that a passive approach to investing will deliver better long-term results, we make some active management decisions. There is a risk that this may result in the fund achieving a return that is lower than its investment objective.

There is also a risk that changes to the UK's rules for recognised overseas pension scheme (**ROPS**) limit your ability to withdraw your investments or affect the UK tax you pay on your investment. We will not be liable for any loss you may suffer if this happens.



## Example of how this applies to an investor


Jess had \$10,000 in the fund and did not make any further contributions. At the end of the year, Jess received a return after fund charges were deducted of \$1,787 (that is 17.87% of her initial \$10,000). Jess paid other charges of \$60. This gives Jess a total return after tax of \$1,727 for the year.
