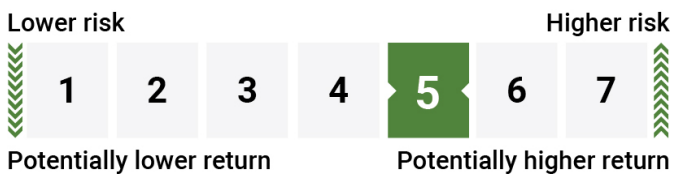
Description of this fund

Invests in growth assets and is designed for investors that want an aggressive investment option that invests in shares and property. Negative annual returns may occur once in every 2-4 years on average.

What are the risks of investing?

Risk indicator for the SuperLife High Growth Fund



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund's assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

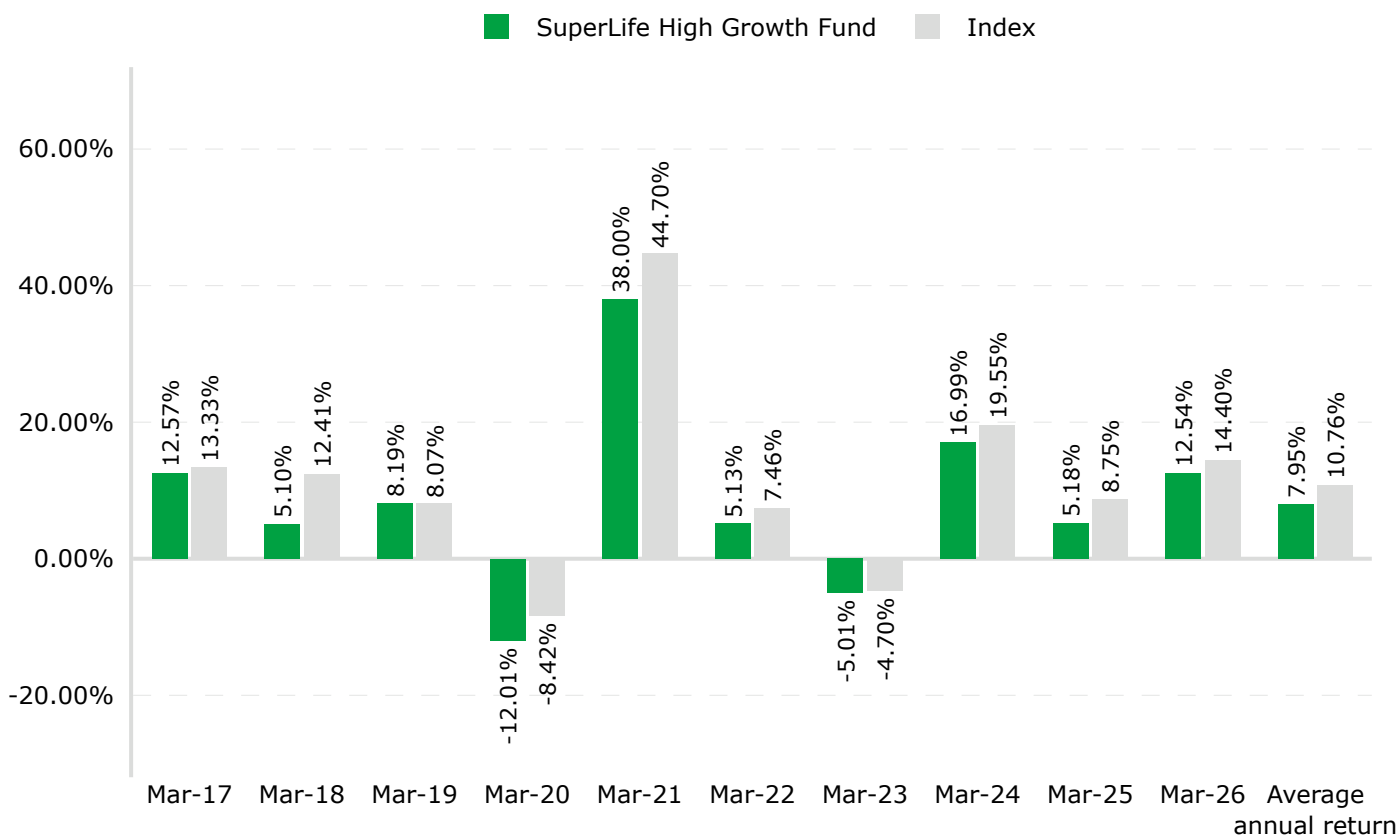

How has the fund performed?

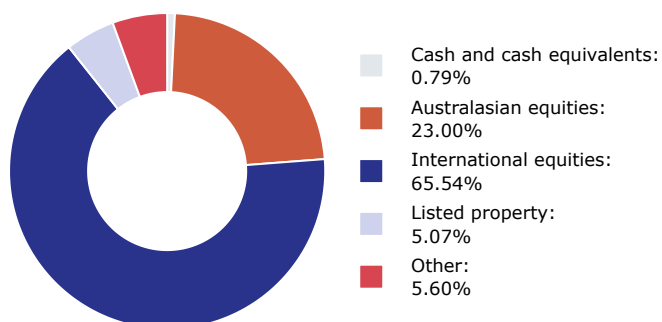
Example of how this applies to an investor

Jess had \$10,000 in the fund at the start of the year and did not make any further contributions. At the end of the year, Jess received a return after fund charges were deducted but before tax of \$1,324 (that is 13.24% of Jess's initial \$10,000). Jess also paid \$12.00 in other charges. This gives Jess a total return after tax of \$1,242 for the year.

Currency hedging

As at 31 March 2026 the fund's exposure to assets denominated in foreign currencies was 87.46%, of which 50.75% was hedged. This means the fund's unhedged foreign currency exposure was 43.08% of the net asset value of the fund. Notes

1. These charges refer to the normal fund operating costs that are charged to the fund. For disclosure purposes, supervisor, audit and legal costs are not included in the manager's basic fee, but are included in the other management and administration charges. Some of these are fixed costs so the amount shown can range from 0.00% up to the total fund charges depending on the total value of the fund.
2. The 'other' category refers to an investment in infrastructure. The underlying investments are infrastructure securities listed in developed countries.
